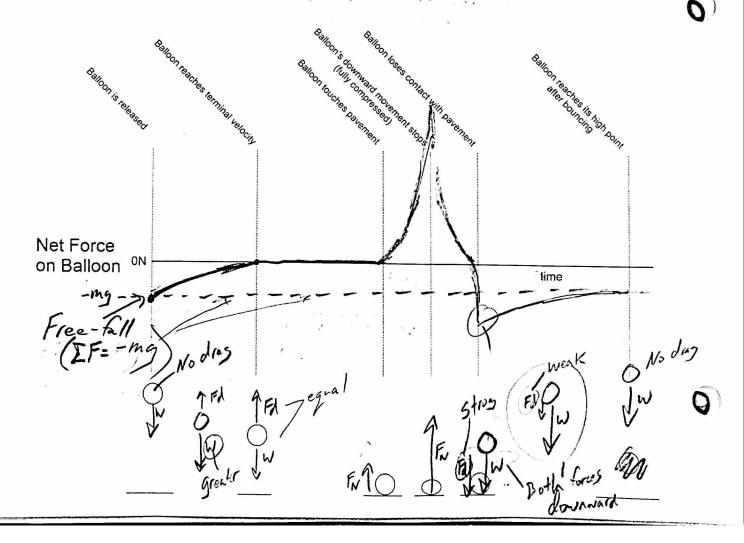

Short Answer:

1. A **50kg** student is standing up in the aisle of a bus as the bus travels rightward toward a stoplight. The bus currently slowing down. The bus and the student are accelerating at a rate of **-3m/s²**. The bus' current velocity is 10m/s. The student does not slip or fall, and he remains in contact only with the floor of the bus. On the diagram, draw <u>all</u> of the <u>individual</u> forces that are <u>acting on the student</u>. Use arrows to show the direction of each force. Label each arrow with an appropriate <u>name</u> of the force, the <u>correct magnitude of the force</u>, and the <u>correct units</u>.

A child inflates a typical rubber balloon and drops it from a roof. The balloon reaches terminal velocity as it falls and eventually hits the pavement below. When the balloon hits the pavement, it compresses, bounces back upward, and reaches some new maximum height before falling back to the pavement. Show the changes in the net force acting on the balloon during its journey. **Assume that up = positive.** The graph times are not organized to scale. Force magnitudes do not have to be exactly to scale. The pictures below the graph are meant to help you understand what is happening to the balloon at each moment.

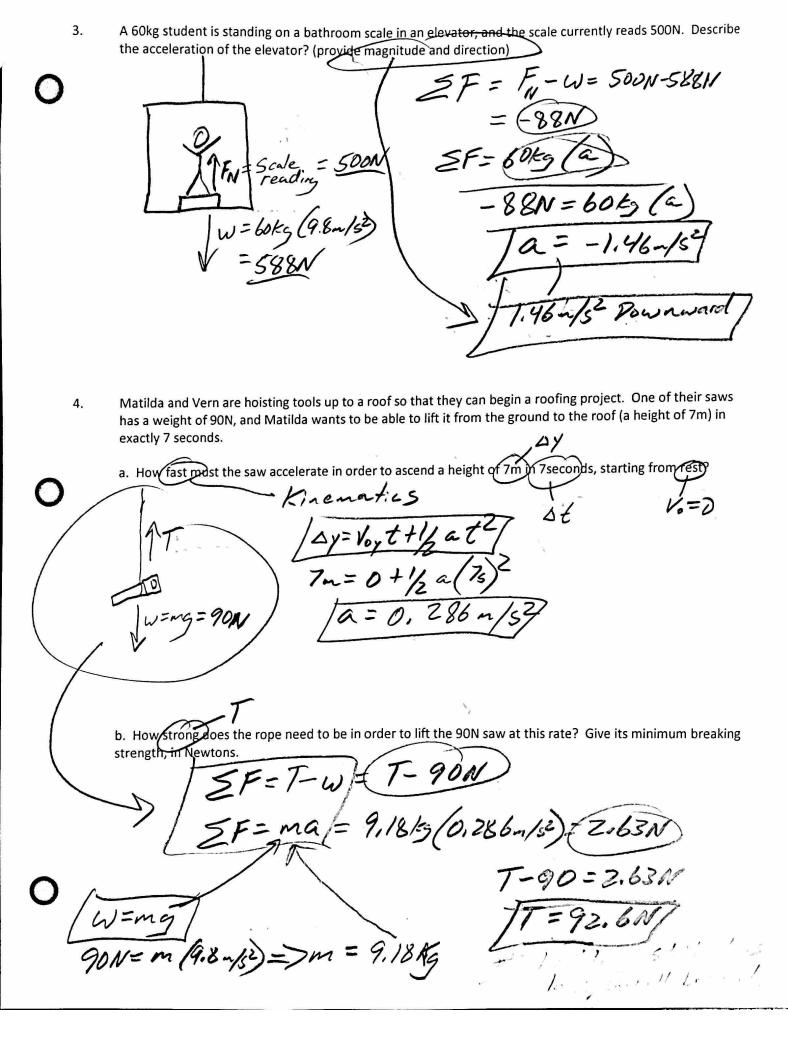

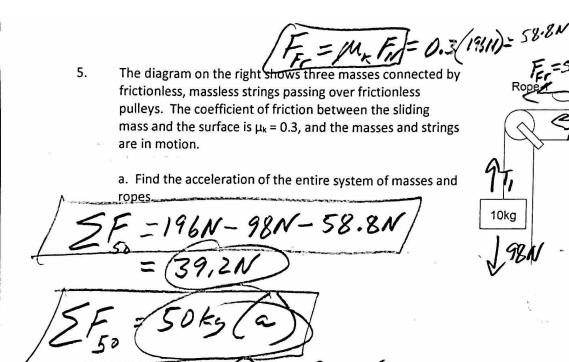

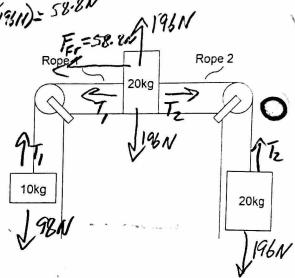
