

Practice - 18.5 Electric Field Lines: Multiple Charges


1. A. Sketch the electric field lines near a point charge +q.




B. Do the same for a point charge -3.00q.



 - B. If d = 1.00 m, -q = -4.00 μ C and the distance from Point P to the x-axis is 1.00 m, what is the magnitude of the electric field at Point P?



4. The electric field lines on the left have twice the separation of those on the right.



A. If the magnitude of the field at A is 40.0 N/C, what is the magnitude of the force on a proton at A?

B. What is the magnitude of the field at B?

5. The nucleus of a plutonium-239 atom contains 94 protons. Assume that the nucleus is a sphere with radius 6.64 fm (1 fm = 10^{-15} m) and with the charge of the protons uniformly spread through the sphere. At the nucleus surface, what are the magnitude and direction (radially inward or outward) of the electric field produced by the protons?

$$E = \frac{kQ}{r^2} = \left(\frac{8.99 \times 10^9 Nn^2}{6.64 \times '0^{-15} m}\right)^2 \left(\frac{94 \text{ protons}}{1.6 \times 10^{-19} \text{ Proton}}\right)^2$$
